Building the Temple of the Lord

Except the Lord build the house, in vain do they labour that build it. Except the Lord guard the city, in vain doth he watch that guardeth her; it is vain for you to rise at dawn. Ps. 126:1-2

The Psalmist/Prophet/King David wrote these words for us over 1000 years before the coming of our Lord. His son, Solomon, built the first temple to the God of Israelites on top of Mount Moriah in Jerusalem. Each one of us Orthodox Christians have the unique opportunity to continue to build this temple.

St. Xenia's Church is truly a miracle and testament to the building power of the Lord. Any one who hears the history of how this church came to be cannot help but be awe struck at the love and commitment expressed by the early members as they worked for and with the Lord in constructing this Holy Temple.

We are, though, not finished. It is a work in progress that will continue throughout our lifetime. We are even now involved in a number of projects that will help St. Xenia's continue to grow. We have contracted with a gifted iconographer for the beautification of our altar with frescoes. We are awaiting a shipment of bells from Russia that will greet our Hierarch on his visit, call us to prayer and bring us to deeper attention during the Divine Services. We are expanding the parking lot so that the increasing number of vehicles on Sundays will be able to park safely and orderly. The list goes on. In order for this and more to continue there are some things that you must do.

Spiritual Life

King David says we labor in vain if we are not working for the Lord. This means that we must be striving after and nurturing a spiritual life. As infants we are brought to the Church, first to be baptized, then to pray and be instructed in the faith. The Church fills our senses with all things beautiful. Not only is our conscience awakened to what is right and what is true, but our earthly hearts are opened to make room for the dwelling of God Himself. We "taste and see that the Lord is good!" When we are brought to Church from an early age, we find ourselves at home there—comforted and strengthened to deal with the outside world which will confront us soon enough. If, like many of us, we come to the Church later in life, we have to strive even harder to break through the encrustations of our past to allow the sweetness of God's love to fill us. We have to be diligent in our prayers, read the soul-forming words of the Fathers and the great works of literature that reflect Godliness to us, and most of all, not deprive our families of the fullness of spiritual life as we may have been deprived.

Stewardship

Though the Lord builds the Temple, He does it with us for our salvation. He provides us with material goods and money not only for ourselves, but so that we can share with the poor. And how better to share than by providing a church where they can eat and drink the very essence of God Himself? What greater help and riches could we bring than to introduce them to the Kingdom of Heaven? Certainly, if God so willed, all of the wealth of His creation would be available to His Church. But no, He instead gives us the opportunity to give of ourselves. While He, in the person of our Lord Jesus Christ, was completely self-emptying for our sake, He only asks us to give back a tenth part because of our weakness. There is no surer way to accumulate the grace we need for salvation than by giving monetarily to the building of the Church. This is because it automatically fulfills those things that our Lord instructs us that we need for salvation—feeding the poor, giving drink to the thirsty, clothing the naked, giving comfort to the sick and imprisoned. It is not that we might not have other opportunities to fulfill this as well, but none more immediate.

Participation

Lastly, we must give of ourselves. We must participate in the fullness of the life of the Church both in our conduct at home and work, and in our faithfulness to the Divine Services. Spiritual life will be fleeting at best if we are not continually pressing ourselves to live as Orthodox, that is, "right glorifiers." Simply showing up at Services for the last few minutes is inadequate and an affront to God.

The truth is that if we do not do all of this, according to our strength, we personally will not be the only ones to lose. We are laboring in the Lord to build this Church for those who are still lost and for the generations to come. It is not, and cannot be, only for us. And if we do not do what is so clearly set before us, "it is vain for you to rise at dawn" to try to build some other kind of life in the world. The Church is eternal, our life in it is eternal, all else is folly and will ultimately fail.

As we prepare to enter into this New Year of the Church, let us each one examine ourselves and renew our commitment to God and to each other. Let us not be found wanting and in need at the hour of our judgment because we were lazy or self-satisfied in our fleeting earthly life.

Why Women Cover Their Heads in Church

...every woman that prayeth or prophesieth with her head uncovered dishonoreth her head... (I Cor. 11:5)

For a visitor to an Old Believer parish, one of the most striking "differences" is the sight of all women, even girls, with their heads covered. The Orthodox tradition that women wear head coverings in church is certainly not peculiar to the Old Rite. One wonders, therefore, why this is not the common practice in all Orthodox churches. It used to be.

There was a case not long ago of a woman who visited the Soviet Union. On a feast day she went to church and at the end of the service went forward to kiss the cross. But when her turn came the priest drew back the cross, explaining that he couldn't allow her to venerate it because her head was uncovered. She protested that she was from abroad and didn't know the local customs, and thought that it was only necessary to cover the head when receiving Holy Communion. The priest told her these were insubstantial excuses, that women should always have their heads covered in church and that he could not permit her to kiss the cross.

Who has ever heard of a priest in this country taking such a firm stand on this question! Some priests make occasional pleas from the ambo, but they seem to have little or only temporary effect. The tradition of covering the head is so little respected nowadays that many--especially among the younger generations of women--are quite unaware of it.

In the interest of fashion, many women are not willing to acknowledge the spiritual benefit to be gained by submitting to this very simple--and meaningful--tradition of covering their heads. This is not a recent innovation but rather an ancient tradition which has been with the Church since the beginning. The Most Holy Virgin Mary herself from a very young age covered her head as a sign of her submission to the will of God, a submission which she later manifest so perfectly on the day of Annunciation. In imitating the Mother of God in this small way, women should feel honored, not humiliated or irritated, and should be thankful for the opportunity which the Church gives them to curb their self-will and to promote a modest disposition.

Why, some ask, aren't men required to do the same? Clergy and monastics, in fact, do have rules for covering their heads in church. But even if such were not the case, who are we to question the wisdom of the Church in requiring of us this small sacrifice of our vanity, our pride, that spark of rebellion which says "Why should I?" Let us pay less attention to how we look and more attention to adorning our souls with the virtues of humility and modesty, virtues we can help cultivate by the simple act of covering our heads in church. Not our will, O Lord, but Thine be done."

St. Seraphim's Camp, a week long camp in the Pocono Mountains of Pennsylvania for the past 9 or so years, was a great success! It was attended this year by over 200 campers from 8 to 18 years of age. Over the course of the week there were 9 priests and a deacon present, along with quite a few matushki, parents, senior and junior counselors. Over a dozen of us from St. Xenia's were at the camp for the week enjoying ourselves, receiving spiritual instruction and edification and both renewing and making new relationships with our brothers and sisters in Orthodoxy—relationships which will most probably last a lifetime.

The camp begins each morning with morning prayers and breakfast, followed by an hour-long Law of God class. All manner of topics both vital and of interest to Orthodox youth are discussed in the various age groups.

The camp, though, is not only about classes. There is a schedule for each group in which they participate in field events, archery, rifle (bb gun) range, arts & crafts, water sports, etc.

It is difficult to fully express the many blessings that we experience at camp. Perhaps you too, whether you have children or grandchildren to bring, or just want to come and pitch in, will have the opportunity to experience it for yourselves.

—Л. Н. Толстой



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DIRECTIONS TO ST. XENIA CHURCH:

From I-93 North or South take Exit 46, Routes 110 and 113 Dracut and Lawrence. If you were travelling North on I-93, take the exit and go around the rotary and under the highway. Follow the signs and bear right off the rotary for Route 110/113 Dracut. **If you were travelling South on I-93,** bear right at the bottom of the exit ramp towards Route 110/113 Dracut.

Where Routes 110 and 113 split, bear right onto Route 113 towards Dracut. You will pass several cemeteries on your left, including the Polish National Catholic Cemetery. The very next gate on the left is the entrance to St. Xenia's. Please note that the church is on the left just before the Hickory Hill Golf course, so if you pass the golf course, you will have missed the church. Parking is available on church grounds.
